

Synaxis of the Saints of North America Commemorated on June 18

On the second Sunday after Pentecost, each local Orthodox Church commemorates all the saints, known and unknown, who have shone forth in its territory. Accordingly, the Orthodox Church in America remembers the saints of North America on this day.

Saints of all times, and in every country are seen as the fulfillment of God's promise to redeem fallen humanity. Their example encourages us to "lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily besets us" and to "run with patience the race that is set before us" (Hebrews 12:1). The saints of North America also teach us how we should live, and what we must expect to endure as Christians

Although it is a relatively young church, the Orthodox Church in America has produced saints in nearly all of the six major categories of saints: Apostles (and Equals of the Apostles); Martyrs (and Confessors); Prophets; Hierarchs; Monastic Saints; and the Righteous. Prophets, of course, lived in Old Testament times and predicted the coming of Christ.

The first Divine Liturgy in what is now American territory (northern latitude 58 degrees, 14 minutes, western longitude 141 degrees) was celebrated on July 20, 1741, the Feast of the Prophet Elias, aboard the ship Peter under the command of Vitus Bering. Hieromonk Hilarion Trusov and the priest Ignatius Kozirevsky served together on that occasion. Several years later, the Russian merchant Gregory I. Shelikov visited Valaam monastery, suggesting to the abbot that it would be desirable to send missionaries to Russian America. *Con't Pg 6*

Departments Release "Essential Orthodox Christian Beliefs"

The 16-chapter "Essential Orthodox Christian Beliefs: A Manual for Adult Instruction," is now available for free download. A cooperative effort of the Departments of the Orthodox Church in America, the groundbreaking work is an offering to the Church to assist clergy and parishes in their work of instructing inquirers and the faithful in the truths of the Orthodox Christian Faith. This work is not meant to replace time-trusted books and publications which have taught generations but to work in concert with them.

Archpriest Thomas Soroka, Project Manager for the Departments of the OCA, said, "We presented this idea to His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon several years ago, to bring together interested pastors, teachers, and scholars from across the Orthodox Church America and produce a presentation of the Orthodox Faith that would emphasize developing an Orthodox Christian worldview. Because of the technology available, it would be a living document that could be periodically refined and perfected. With the initial

publication of this manual, we will now work to develop supportive media for teachers to present the lessons in an effective way."

Chancellor of the OCA, Archpriest Alexander Rentel, stated, "We commend this manual for use in our parishes and institutions, and indeed, to all inquirers and Christians who desire to know more about the Orthodox Faith. We are grateful to the authors and contributors to this volume and especially to the donors who generously support the missionary outreach of the Church."

Order of St. Romanos Awarded to Noted Liturgical Musician

Reader John Joseph Tome, Choir Master at Saint Nicholas Orthodox Church, Burton, MI (Bulgarian Diocese) for over thirty-six years was awarded the Order of Saint Romanos on Sunday, June 11, 2023. His Eminence Archbishop Alexader of the Bulgarian Diocese presented the award at the conclusion of the pontifical Divine Liturgy which he celebrated with Archpriest Matthew-Peter Butrie, rector, and Archpriest Robert Royer, attached clergy, and Protodeacon Luke Gonser, attached clergy.

Established by the Holy Synod of Bishops in 2014 under the patronage of Saint Romanos the Melodist, the Order is awarded to influential arrangers, composers, teachers, and conductors. Past recipients include Archimandrite Roman [Braga], Archpriest Sergei Glagolev, Archpriest Igor Soroka, Prof. Dr. David Drillock, Dr. Vladimir Morosan, Archpriest Martin Nicolai, Aleksei V. Shipovalnikov, Walter Shymansky, John Sutko and Carol Wetmore.

"It is a joy that Archbishop Alexander was able to present this award to Reader John Joseph who has worked tirelessly in arranging music and setting musical settings for use not only at Saint Nicholas Church but throughout the Bulgarian Diocese," said Father Matthew.

Reader John Joseph Tome graduated from Albion College, Albion, MI in 1974 with a B.A. in voice and piano. He was tonsured a reader in 1974 at Saint Andrew Orthodox Church, East Lansing, MI (Moscow Patriarchate) by Bishop Makary (Svistun), administrator of the Patriarchal Parishes in the USA.

He assisted Very Rev. Basil Karpelania with music at Holy Trinity Ukrainian Orthodox Church in Saginaw. In 1977 he became choir director at Saint Nicholas Orthodox Church, Burton (OCA Bulgarian Diocese) a position he held until 1995. when he became choir director at Saints Peter and Paul Orthodox Church (OCA Midwest

Diocese). In 2005, at the invitation of Very Rev. Raphael Biernacki he again became choir director at Saint Nicholas Church in Burton, a ministry which he continues to fulfill to this day.

In addition to writing church music for use with English, using music software he has begun to arrange texts in the prescribed podoben melodies which he sings and leads at Great Vespers on Saturday evenings. These melodies and the compilation of the texts and music which he does weekly for Saint Nicholas Church are made available on the website of the Bulgarian Diocese.

In 2012 he prepared the music and led the choir responses for the episcopal consecration of Archbishop Alexander and the Liturgy the day after the consecration. Reader John Joseph Tome prepared the choir and led the singing for the funeral of Archpriest Raphael Biernacki at Saint Nicholas Church, Burton and also prepared the choir at Saint Nicholas Cathedral, Fort Wayne, IN for the funeral of Archpriest George Nedelkoff.

In 2022 he led the choir at St Nicholas Cathedral, Fort Wayne, for the 10th anniversary of the episcopal consecration of Archbishop Alexander.

He expresses to gratitude to Dr. Vladimir Morosan for his assistance in utilizing music arranging software for the melodies he has been preparing for use.

Following the Liturgy at which Protodeacon Luke Gonser was awarded the kamilavka, both were honored with a festive brunch and cake in the parish fellowship hall.

Early Registration Discount for Parish Development Forum Ends June 22; Speakers Announced

Persons planning to attend the Parish Development Forum, to be held at Holy Trinity Church in Parma OH from 1:00 PM July 13th through noon on July 15, are reminded that the early registration discount period ends on June 22. Registration is ongoing. The theme for the 2023 Forum is "Our Parish and the Future".

Registration and Hotel Discount Deadline June 22

We are encouraging Forum attendees to register early for a number of reasons," said Joseph Kormos Forum lay co-chair. "First, to keep conference attendance costs low, the Forum is offering an early discount period. Those registering by June 22 can attend at the discounted rate of \$75 per person. Secondly, to assure an atmosphere of robust discussion. Forum attendance will be limited to 100 persons. Since registrations are running ahead of previous Forums, once limits are reached registrations will close. Additionally, for those needing hotel accommodations, the hotel group rate discount also ends on June 22. Since hotel rooms are expected to be at a premium in suburban Cleveland in that time frame, early reservations assure discounted hotel access." Forum Speakers Announced

"We are excited about the plans for the 2023 Forum," said Archpriest Stephen Frase clergy cochair of the Forum. "The Orthodox Convert Survey, initiated to provide content and context for the Forum, attracted an overwhelming response of over 750 submissions in a relatively short time. The results of the survey, which will help parishes to communicate well with those who may be active seekers and to prepare parishioners to welcome and integrate them into parish life and ministry, will be shared in the Forum discussion segment entitled 'Attracting and Integrating

Converts'. Other discussion segments will include 'Healthy Clergy-Laity Dynamics' and 'Connecting with the Neighborhood'. In addition, a few important topical presentations from keynote speakers will occur. Steve Christoforou, formerly the Youth leader and creator of the "Be the Bee" video series for the Greek Archdiocese and now the Director of Operations for FOCUS NA, will speak on "Meeting the Needs of Young People Today". Father Adam Roberts, dean of St. Athanasius College and a prime mover behind the Orthodox movie 'Becoming Truly Human', will speak on "Personal Purpose: A Primary Ingredient for Leadership". In addition, Scott Thumma, lead researcher with the Hartford Institute of Religious Research will the discuss the 'Key Trends Influencing the Future for Christian Communities' in US including recent research on Orthodox communities."

Now in its tenth year, the Parish Development Forum, is a clergy/laity conference which explores the challenges facing Orthodox parishes, delivers actionable ideas and good practices valuable to parish leaders and builds mutually supportive relationships among participants. The Forum is co-sponsored by the Orthodox Church in America's Archdiocese of Western Pennsylvania, the Diocese of the Midwest and the Bulgarian Diocese.

On September 24, 1794, after a journey of 7,327 miles (the longest missionary journey in Orthodox history) and 293 days, a group of monks from Valaam arrived on Kodiak Island in Alaska. The mission was headed by Archimandrite Joasaph, and included Hieromonks Juvenal, Macarius, and Athanasius, the Hierodeacons Nectarius and Stephen, and the monks Herman and Joasaph. Saint Herman of Alaska (December 13, August 9), the last surviving member of the mission, fell asleep in the Lord in 1837.

Throughout the Church's history, the seeds of faith have always been watered by the blood of the martyrs. The Protomartyr Juvenal was killed near Lake Iliamna by natives in 1799, thus becoming the first Orthodox Christian to shed his blood for Christ in the New World. In 1816, Saint Peter the Aleut was put to death by Spanish missionaries in California when he refused to convert to Roman Catholicism.

Missionary efforts continued in the nineteenth century, with outreach to the native peoples of Alaska. Two of the most prominent laborers in Christ's Vineyard were Saint Innocent Veniaminov (March 31 and October 6) and Saint Jacob Netsvetov (July 26), who translated Orthodox services and books into the native languages. Father Jacob Netsvetev died in Sitka in 1864 after a life of devoted service to the Church. Father John Veniaminov, after his wife's death, received monastic tonsure with the name Innocent. He died in 1879 as the Metropolitan of Moscow.

As the nineteenth century was drawing to a close, an event of enormous significance for the North American Church took place. On March 25, 1891, Bishop Vladimir went to Minneapolis to receive Saint Alexis Toth (May 7) and 361 of his parishioners into the Orthodox Church. This was the beginning of the return of many Uniates to Orthodoxy.

Saint Tikhon (Bellavin), the future Patriarch of Moscow (April 7, October 9), came to America as bishop of the diocese of the Aleutians and Alaska in September 1898. As the only Orthodox bishop on the continent, Saint Tikhon traveled extensively throughout North America in order to minister to his widely scattered and diverse flock. He realized that the local church here could not be a permanent extension of the Russian Church. Therefore, he focused his efforts on giving the American Church a diocesan and parish structure which would help it mature and grow.

Saint Tikhon returned to Russia in 1907, and was elected as Patriarch of Moscow ten years later. He died in 1925, and for many years his exact burial place remained unknown. Saint Tikhon's grave was discovered on February 22, 1992 in the smaller cathedral of Our Lady of the Don in the Don *Con't Pg 9*

Credit for originating the holiday is generally given to Sonora Smart Dodd of Spokane, Washington, whose father, a Civil War veteran, raised her and her five siblings after their mother died in childbirth. She is said to have had the idea in 1909 while listening to a sermon on Mother's Day, which at the time was becoming established as a holiday. Local religious leaders supported the idea, and the first Father's Day was celebrated on June 19, 1910, the month of the birthday of Dodd's father. In 1924 U.S. Pres. Calvin Coolidge gave his support to the observance, and in 1966 Pres. Lyndon B. Johnson issued a proclamation that recognized the day. It became a national holiday in 1972, when Pres. Richard Nixon signed legislation designating the third Sunday of June as Father's Day.

Although it was originally largely a religious holiday, Father's Day has been commercialized with the sending of greeting cards and the giving of gifts. Some observe the custom of wearing a red rose to indicate that one's father is living or a white rose to indicate that he is deceased. Other males—for example, grandfathers or uncles who have assumed parenting roles—are often also honoured on the day. Some Roman Catholics have continued to observe the feast day of St. Joseph, on March 19, as a tribute to fathers.

Saint Raphael of Brooklyn (February 27) was the first Orthodox bishop to be consecrated in North America. Archimandrite Raphael Hawaweeny was consecrated by Bishop Tikhon and Bishop Innocent (Pustynsky) at Saint Nicholas Cathedral in New York on March 13, 1904. As Bishop of Brooklyn, Saint Raphael was a trusted and capable assistant to Saint Tikhon in his archpastoral ministry. Saint Raphael reposed on February 27, 1915.

The first All American Council took place March 5-7, 1907 at Mayfield, PA, and the main topic was "How to expand the mission." Guidelines and directions for missionary activity, and statutes for the administrative structure of parishes were also set forth.

In the twentieth century, in the aftermath of the Russian Revolution, countless men, women, and children received the crown of martyrdom rather than renounce Christ. Saints John Kochurov (October 31) and Alexander Hotovitzky (December 4 and August 7) both served the Church in North America before going back to Russia. Saint John became the first clergyman to be martyred in Russia on October 31, 1917 in Saint Petersburg. Saint Alexander Hotovitzky, who served in America until 1914, was killed in 1937.

In addition to the saints listed above, we also honor those saints who are known only to God, and have not been recognized officially by the Church. As we contemplate the lives of these saints, let us remember that we are also called by God to a life of holiness.
