On Saturday, January 18, the feast of Saint Athanasius the Great, and Saint Cyril of Alexandria, His Eminence Archbishop Daniel of Chicago and the Midwest celebrated the Divine Liturgy at the Diocesan Cathedral, Holy Trinity Cathedral, Chicago, IL.

Celebrating with His Eminence were Archpriest Herman Kincaid, Chancellor, Priest Alexander Koranda, Cathedral Dean, Archpriest George Gary, Priest Jacob VanSickle, Protodeacon Nicholas Denysenko, Deacon Paul Garklavs, and Deacon Niola Tambur. The choir was directed by Reader Philip Sokolov.

Before the liturgy, the Archbishop tonsured Seminarian Joseph Winsler as a Reader, and then ordained him to the Subdiaconate. After the Great Entrance, Protodeacon Nicholas was ordained to the priesthood and following the consecration of the Holy Gifts, Subdeacon Joseph was ordained to the diaconate.

The Archbishop congratulated the newly ordained after the liturgy offering his prayers and blessings. A meal was held at a local restaurant in celebration of the occasion.

COMISS Network Holds Annual Forum

On Monday, January 13, 2025, the COMISS Network held its Annual Forum: "Celebrating 100 years in Clinical Pastoral Education and Training: Pastoral, Present, and the Future", in Silver Spring, MD. The Seventh-Day Adventist community hosted this gathering at their world headquarters there, complete with a hybrid room, allowing full physical and virtual attendance. Archpriest Steven Voytovich, the current COMISS National Leadership Teach Chair, noted this was a high water mark for him as his final function as team chair.

The COMISS Network is a national common roundtable for pastoral care and counseling, founded in 1979-1980. Religious endorsers, credentialing bodies for chaplaincy (such as APC, ACPE, CPSP and others), those who employ chaplains, and theological schools are included as member organization categories. In addition to this annual forum, COMISS oversees Pastoral/Spiritual Care Week, celebrated in caregiving institutions in October each year, and the COMISS Commission for Accrediting Pastoral Care Services (CCAPS) that accredits institutions for the delivery of pastoral services. Fr. Steven served as Chair-Elect for two years, responsible for planning this annual forum, followed by serving the past two years

as Chair of the Leadership Team.

Dr. Robert Charles Powell is a trained Medical Historian and Psychiatrist, who has been actively following the clinical training movement since it's 50th anniversary in 1975, regularly presenting on the works of the movement's founders: Anton Boisen, Helen Flander Dunbar, and others. Dr. Powell offered the keynote address: "Crisis as a Means of Meaningful Growth." In the past, he also served as a CCAPS Commissioner.

Fr. Steven offered a presentation at this forum entitled: "Toward a White Paper on Clinical Training and Formation." This included introductory comments by Dr. Robert Cooke, a Pastoral Psychotherapist who has assisted in forming an open discussion group for this discipline through the COMISS Network roundtable. Fr. Steven has met with this group monthly for more than the past year, in his role as chair, seeking to dialogue about the future of this discipline.

Dr. Robert G. Anderson, who served as Father Steven's CPE Residency Supervisor at Bridgeport Hospital in Bridgeport, CT, during 1992-93, was among the attendees. It was during this residency that Dr. Anderson introduced Fr. Steven to the existence of the COMISS Network, planting the seeds that one day the Orthodox



This was realized in 2005-06, thanks in large part to the dedicated efforts of then-Father David Brum, who served as Secretary at the Orthodox Church in America's Chancery and is now His Eminence Archbishop Daniel of Chicago and the Midwest.

Fr. Steven also expressed heartfelt congratulations to his former supervisor-in-training, Dr. Denise Parker Lawrence, who played an important role in organizing this first in-person COMISS Network forum since the pandemic. Now serving as Chair-Elect of the Leadership Team, Dr. Lawrence will assume the role of Chair at the conclusion of this forum. Please watch for presentation materials on the COMISS Network website, in the coming days!

Archpriest Steven Voytovich serves as the founding Director of the Office of Institutional Chaplains for the Orthodox Church in America, providing endorsements for Orthodox Church in America chaplains serving in non-military settings. He has previously served as Chair of the nation-wide Association of Religious Endorsing Bodies (AREB), and has just completed four years, in leadership roles of the COMISS Network Leadership Team.

He has both attended and served as a leadership team member and plenary presenter of the International Congress for Pastoral Care and Counseling (ICPPC). This congress meets every four years at various locations around the globe. Fr. Steven was often the only Orthodox representative at these congresses held in Ghana Africa (1999), India, East Germany/Poland, and New Zealand (2011). All of this participation has grown out of his efforts to realize the dream of the Orthodox Church's participation in these greater roundtables.

New Martyrs and Confessors of Russia Commemorated on January 26

On the Sunday closest to January 25, the Church commemorates the Synaxis of the Holy New Martyrs and Confessors of Russia, remembering all those Orthodox Christians who suffered for Christ at the hands of the godless Soviets during the years of persecution. These include the royal Passion Bearers Tsar Nicholas II and his family, and the Grand Duchess Elizabeth. Countless thousands of martyrs, both clergy and laity also suffered, some of whose names are known, as well as millions of simple believers whose names have been lost to history.

It is estimated that the number of the New Martyrs of Russia, who were glorified by the Russian Orthodox Church at the Jubilee Council of 2000, far exceeds that of all the martyrs who died for Christ during the first three centuries of Christianity. The Russian Church lost millions of its sons and daughters, not only at the hands of external enemies, but also those of their own country. Among those who were murdered and tortured in the years of persecution were countless Orthodox: laity, monks, priests, and bishops, whose only "crime" was their unshakable faith in God.

In the long history of the world, never have so many new heavenly intercessors been glorified by the Church in such a way (more than one thousand New Martyrs were numbered among the saints). Among those who suffered for their faith were some who labored in America before the Russian Revolution: St. Tikhon, Patriarch of Moscow and All Russia (April 7); St. Alexander Hotovitzky (Dec. 4); St. John Kochurov (Oct. 31).

His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon Announces Sanctity of Life Sunday, January 26, 2025

His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon has designated Sunday, January 26, 2025, as Sanctity of Life Sunday to be observed in the parishes of the Orthodox Church in America. His Beatitude has also released the following statement below. Resources for liturgical prayers and petitions can be accessed on the Sanctity of Life Resource Page.

Sanctity of Life Sunday falls two days after the annual March for Life, scheduled for Friday, January 24, 2025. This date marks the anniversary of the Roe v. Wade ruling that legalized abortion in the United States. Other participants in this year's march will be members of the Holy Synod of Bishops, representatives from the stavropegial seminaries, and Orthodox Christians from across the country. On Thursday, January 23, 2025, Vespers will be held at St. Mark Church, 7124 River Rd, Bethesda, MD at 6:00 PM.

The Orthodox gathering at the March for Life will begin at 11:30 AM on the National Mall, on Constitution Ave between 16th and 14th St NW. The March for Life Rally will take place from 12:00 PM to 1:00 PM, during which time His Beatitude will lead the Orthodox faithful in a Service of Supplication for an End to Abortion at approximately 12:30 PM.

At 1:00 PM, the March for Life will commence. The Orthodox group will sing hymns while processing and plans to exit the march before its conclusion. However, participants are welcome to continue to the Supreme Court, where the march is scheduled to conclude by 4:00 PM.

You are invited to join His Beatitude and other Orthodox faithful from across the nation in commemorating the victims of abortion and standing in witness to the sanctity of life.

To the Clergy, Monastics, and Faithful of the Orthodox Church in America,

My Beloved Children in the Lord,

As we mark our annual Sanctity of Life Sunday, I would like to speak to you about martyrdom. Specifically, by understanding martyrdom, which we might consider the most pure, fundamental realization of the Christian vocation, we understand just why we hold life sacred.

At first, this may appear paradoxical. Martyrdom, after all, is willingly surrendering one's life for the sake of the Christian faith. Martyrdom teaches us that life in this world is not to be compared with the glorious and everlasting life that awaits us in the world to come. As the Lord says, "Whosoever shall lose his life for my sake and the Gospel's, the same shall save it" (Mk. 8:35).

100th Anniversary of Repose of St. Tikhon of Moscow to be Commemorated in Joint Celebration

The Diocese of the Midwest of the Orthodox Church in America (OCA), along with the Mid-American Diocese of the Russian Orthodox Church Abroad (ROCOR), is pleased to announce the upcoming joint celebration honoring the 100th anniversary of the repose of St. Tikhon of Moscow, Enlightener of North America.

The two dioceses will come together on Saturday, February 22 at 9:30a to celebrate the Hierarchical Liturgy. The centennial celebration will take place at the historic Holy Trinity Cathedral, Chicago, IL, the first Orthodox church in Chicago. The Cathedral shares an intimate and personal connection with the saint who selected the current site and design with his priest, Hieromartyr John of Chicago, and consecrated the holy temple with St. John and Hieromartyr Alexander Hotovitsky in 1903.

Hierarchs from the OCA, ROCOR, and other local churches will lead the liturgy, with clergy from both dioceses serving with them. The responses will be sung antiphonally by the Virgin Mary Protection Cathedral Choir, under the direction of Michael Gill, and the Chicago Deanery Choir by Reader Philip Sokolov.

Following the divine services, those gathered are invited for a festive meal and concert that will take place in the Grand Hall of St. George Cathedral (OCA), less than a mile away from where Divine Liturgy will be celebrated.

The two dioceses came together for this centennial observance due to the significant tie the territory has to the saint. On September 14, 1898, Bishop Tikhon was made Bishop of the Aleutians and Alaska, and in 1905. the American Mission was made an Archdiocese, and Saint Tikhon was elevated to the rank of Archbishop. In 1907 the holy hierarch returned to Russia and eventually was elected as the Patriarch of Russia during one of the most turbulent times in the country's history. Patriarch Tikhon fell asleep in the Lord on April 7, 1925. He had suffered greatly during the years of turmoil and persecution that followed the Russian Revolution. He was laid to rest in the monastery's small "winter" cathedral. Subsequently the monastery was closed and repurposed, and the relics of Saint Tikhon were moved for safe keeping. The Donskoy Monastery subsequently was returned to the Church and has been restored. It was on Saturday, February 22, 1992, that Saint Tikhon's relics were discovered, hidden deep beneath the floor of the small cathedral.

Clergy and faithful are invited to participate in this event in the coming weeks as we honor a great laborer and missionary saint of the Midwest.

1 Timothy 1:15-17 (Epistle)

This is a faithful saying and worthy of all acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am chief. However, for this reason I obtained mercy, that in me first Jesus Christ might show all long-suffering, as a pattern to those who are going to believe on Him for everlasting life. Now to the King eternal, immortal, invisible, to God who alone is wise, be honor and glory forever and ever. Amen.

BORN AGAIN

Taken from the Orthodox Church: 455 Questions & Answers.

Question: Why are we told in Eastern Orthodoxy not to use the phrase "born again' for spiritual renewal, when it is used in the Bible?

Answer: You state the question precisely—and you deserve a precise answer. We are concerned about the correct "use" of the term "born again," as well as its "abuse" here. The Bible's use of "born again connects it with baptism. It is used just three times in the New Testament, twice in the conversation of Jesus with Nicodemus. There Jesus explains the meaning of "born again." He says "unless one is born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the Kingdom of God." (John 3:5). Thus, when St. Paul describes baptism he speaks of immersion into the water of baptism as "the old man dying" and our rising up out of the baptismal waters as being brought to newness of life and "from death to life." (Romans 6:1-14). The other use is in 1 Peter, in the middle of a passage which refers to Christ's saving work, the "good news which is preached to you." Baptism is how we accept and begin to share in that saving work (1 Peter 1:13-25).

Therefore, you see, being "born again" in the Orthodox understanding is accomplished at our baptism. If we become lax, if our spiritual life is deadened, if we allow our sins to keep the joy and inspiration of God away, if weas persons already part of God's household—"quench the Spiit" in our lives, then what s needed is repentance. To avoid confusing what is accomplished once through baptism and what we need repeatedly in our lives as a constant feature of our lives, we Orthodox don't confuse the term "born again" for "repentance." "Born again" happens at Baptism; repentance takes place as a constant "turning of our mind to God," repeatedly giving ourselves over to God in our lives. When Protestants use the term "born again" to mean repentance, they in effect make baptism of no significance. This is an abuse of the Biblical phrase. (pages 45-46)

Registration Opens for Delegates and Observers for the 21st All-American Council

The Orthodox Church in America has announced the opening of registration for the 21st All-American Council (AAC), which will take place from July 14-18, 2025, at the Arizona Grand Resort in Phoenix, AZ. All clergy and faithful are invited to participate with this year's theme being "Gathered Together By Christ."

The All-American Council is the highest legislative and administrative gathering of the Orthodox Church in America. It is a time for our Church to come together to focus on worship and engaging in the conciliar decision-making process. It is also our opportunity for spiritual renewal and strengthening relationships across North America by participating in the divine services, plenary sessions, and other events.

Delegate and Observer Registration

Registration for delegates and observers is now open and can be accessed through the official AAC website: oca.org/aac. The registration deadline is Friday, July 4th, 2025. Future delegates are, nonetheless, encouraged to register sooner and secure their hotel reservations.

Hotel accommodations must be reserved separately at the time of registration. The special Council Link is available here and on the AAC webpage. A special rate of \$159.00 per night (including resort fees) is being offered for delegates. The hotel reservation deadline is also Friday, July 4th, 2025. Each room includes a separate living area and four complementary admissions to the waterpark. More information can be found on the hotel website here.

Delegates are reminded to review the procedures for selection in accordance with Article III, Sections 2 and 7 of the Statute of the Orthodox Church in America (Link). It is the responsibility of each diocese to collect and submit AAC assessments following their established procedures. These assessments cover AAC-related expenses for parish clergy and lay delegates, excluding travel, hotel, and meal costs. Observers may register with their parish rector's approval, and they are responsible for their own expenses.

Observers have the option to attend for the entire week or selected days. Costs for observers, including optional attendance at the Grand Banquet, will be detailed during the registration process. Retired clergy and clergy widows are eligible for waived fees as at the previous Council.

Travel arrangements may be made through FOS Tours & Travel, Inc. (Lucy Morrone, 516-937-7757).

Registration Process

All registrants must provide a valid email address for communication purposes. Once registration is complete,

it will be reviewed by the AAC team, and the names of delegates will be submitted to diocesan hierarchs for approval. Final confirmation emails with additional check-in instructions will be sent upon approval.

Observers must also receive approval from their parish priest and diocesan hierarch. Once approved, a confirmation email with detailed check-in instructions will be provided.

Registrants are encouraged to save their assigned registration numbers in order to log on to edit any information if needed.

About the Youth Program

This engaging week-long program, designed for students entering grades K-12 in fall 2025, offers an inspiring opportunity to deepen their faith, connect with other Orthodox Christian youth from North America, enjoy the exciting water park at the resort, visit one of the largest aquariums in North America, and participate in the indoor Orthodox Big Game Day!

"Gathering for All-American Councils has been lifechanging for our family," said Matushka Ashley, who is overseeing the program with her husband, Fr. Jason Foster. "Our children made memories they cherish and friendships that will last a lifetime," added Matushka Ashley. Fr Jason commented, "The AAC is an opportunity for our children and youth to connect to our greater Church family and learn more about who we are as the Orthodox Church in America."

In keeping with the All-American Council's overarching theme of "Gathered Together by Christ", educational events and interactive sessions will be explored daily. Moreover, the All-American gathering will be uniquely special this summer for our children and youth as they will have the opportunity to witness the ongoing canonization of Matushka Olga and the 100th anniversary of the repose of St. Tikhon.

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that "blessed are you when men shall revile you, and persecute you, and say all manner of evil against you falsely for my sake. Rejoice, and be exceedingly glad, for great is your reward in heaven" (Matt. 5:11–12). When we are rejected by the world because we accept the Gospel—when we reject the world in order to take up our Cross—then we display the Christian faith in all its truth and power and glory. Martyrdom, etymologically and in fact, always means "bearing witness," and the greatest and most fundamental way to bear witness to the Gospel is to die for the sake of the Gospel.

However, martyrdom, even when it points us towards the next life, also testifies to the immeasurable sacredness of our mortal life in this world. Here, in this life, it is possible for us to bear witness; here, in this life, we have the possibility of accepting Christ's gift of salvation. This is true for the literal martyrs, but it is also possible for every Christian through the bloodless martyrdom of asceticism. Whenever we die to our fleshly desires for the sake of the Gospel, we suffer a little martyrdom. Whenever we forgo power or wealth or gratification for the sake of Christ's commandments, we are bearing witness, in a small way, to the truth of the Christian faith.

In other words, martyrdom proper, as well as the ascetic martyrdom to which we are all called, are a way of "redeeming the time" (Eph. 5:16). Through Christ's Incarnation and Passion, the fallen world and passing present age have become an arena of spiritual struggle and the place where salvation is accomplished.

Seen from this perspective, life in this world is not something cheap and utilitarian, but incredibly dear. The Lord gives us this life that we might offer it back to him, fulfilling our primordial role as priest and mediator of creation: man is called to commend himself and his fellow-men and all his life to Christ our God.

All life comes from God; all life belongs to God; and through the saving work of our Lord and God and Savior Jesus Christ, biological life in this world is now open to the possibility of true and everlasting life in the world to come.

Thus, on this Sanctity of Life Sunday, we bear witness to the truth that all human life, from conception to natural death, is sacred. We pray that the scales will fall from the eyes of our countrymen who do not recognize this basic truth, and we beseech the Lord that all violations of this holy principle—abortion, infanticide, euthanasia, and the rest—would come to a swift end in our age and our land. Finally, we pray that we might find the strength to live in accordance with this teaching, showing forth the sanctity of life by devoting our own life to the pursuit of sanctity, thus bearing witness in our flesh to the truth of the holy Orthodox Christian faith.
